## PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

#### Parish Council Notes – Council Meeting 3<sup>rd</sup> January 2018

Allotments: Although some vacant plots have been re-allocated, there are still a number of vacant plots at the Cemetery Lane site, and interested residents are asked to contact the Council so these can be re-allocated without delay. It's hoped that tenants will come forward before the growing season to avoid fallow plots getting out of hand.

**Youth**: The Council is considering increasing the number of outreach sessions to be provided in 2018 to enable youth workers to engage with young people locally, over a longer period.

**Winter weather**: Please see the separate article on page 5 for further information on the Council's winter weather plans.

**Riverside Walk**: Works to improve the verge between Sherborne and Victoria St by laying part-cobbled matting, part-turf are scheduled to have completed at the end of January, weather permitting. It's hoped that residents will agree these works have greatly improved the appearance of Riverside Walk, and will help to protect the reduced areas of turf which are now separated from the public footpath. Any areas of turf on the Village Green which were damaged by the temporary works compound will be made good by contractors at the end of the works period. Residents will remember that Council did canvass local traders for financial support for this project, as it will have a major benefit for the tourist trade. The response from local businesses was not overwhelming (although grateful thanks again to those businesses which did contribute) and it's hoped that, now the project nears completion and they can see the full effect of the work, more traders will come forward and support us in this venture.

**Budget and precept 2018-19:** The Council approved its budget for 2018-19 at the January meeting, and is pleased to be able to confirm a 4% reduction in its precept for this coming year. It is also considering a strategy for the investment of reserves which it is required by law to set aside for contingency purposes, in order to maximise income from these monies so this can be used to fund local projects. A statement setting out its rationale for the budget and investment strategy will be available on the Council's website, once approved at the February Council meeting.

**Village Green hire:** The Council will be making its first consideration of requests from local groups to hire the Village Green at its meeting on 7<sup>th</sup> February. Any requests received after that date will be considered at the next meeting following their receipt.

Annual Parish Meeting: An early reminder that the Annual Parish Meeting will be held on Wednesday 28<sup>th</sup> March at 7pm in the Community Centre. This year the Council will be canvassing residents regarding Continued on page 2 column 2

#### Winter Weather Arrangements

During the late December spell of bad weather, a number of questions were asked as to why Glos. County Council (GCC), or indeed Bourton Parish Council, did not clear all roads or footpaths in the village.

GCC's first priority is to keep the strategic road network running by clearing main roads to ensure supplies and traffic can get through - in Bourton, this means Station Rd, Meadow Way, Moore Rd, Lansdowne and Rissington Rd. This is done admirably with the use of gritting vehicles and local Snow Plough Operators. They do not have sufficient means to clear and grit secondary roads – when you consider the number of secondary roads throughout the district, and the geographical spread of communities over a very large area, it's evident this would not be achievable. Footpaths are not cleared for a number of reasons, namely cost, resources and sheer impracticability when you again consider the number of footpaths in any one community.

The Parish Council has limited resources it can call on to ensure grit bins are full and re-stocked during winter. Each of the 12 village grit bins takes approximately 8-10 bags of grit to fill – it's therefore easy to understand the amount of grit stocks that can be gone through in a bad weather event, as well as the impact on the Council's limited manpower resources in refilling these.

The Parish Council also maintains a supply of grit/salt that can be given out to residents or businesses for use on public areas only, as well as lending out grit spreading equipment which spreads the grit evenly and thereby maximises stocks. As in most communities across the country, resilience in bad weather relies to a large degree on individuals (both residents and businesses/traders) pulling together and supplementing the work of the country and parish councils.

If each property owner, particularly business owners in the village centre, could clear the footpath in front of their own property as soon as possible after snow falls this would help enormously, particularly in keeping the High St clear so residents and visitors can access local shops and services. In reality, this is really considered good practice for any responsible property owner. The cost of buying in 1 or 2 bags of salt/grit is probably within the means of most businesses, and household salt is available at a very low cost, and is very effective in keeping paths free of ice once cleared. For those unable to buy in their own stocks, they can collect small quantities of grit (eg 2-3 bags) and borrow grit spreading equipment from the Parish Council for use on public areas only. The Council will also re-



stock the grit bins around the village as soon as possible after these become empty. However, again we would ask that this grit is used responsibly and not spread in clumps which depletes the stocks quickly.

We'd therefore ask that residents and businesses prepare now for any future bad weather by buying in grit/salt in advance, where possible. It would also be helpful if residents in all streets could get together now and form small volunteer groups which could be mobilised promptly during bad weather to help clear paths in their area, and assist those in their street who are less able to help themselves. When a bad weather forecast is issued, they are asked to grit paths in advance, and clear snow as soon as possible after it falls. Where residents or businesses are unable to do so, please make arrangements to collect grit and borrow equipment from the Council during office hours, and return the equipment promptly so others can use this.

Contrary to many people's understanding there are no laws which prevent you from clearing snow and ice on the pavement outside your homes or from public areas. However, it's obvious that this should be done responsibly and with due care for yourself and for others. Basic guidelines are that snow should be cleared if possible when loose and easier to move, be responsible about where you are moving snow to, do not use water on paths as this will turn to ice, and spread salt afterwards which will prevent re-freezing. In respect of the use of equipment and snow clearance in general, we have some guidelines from The Met Office (https://www.metoffice.gov.uk/ barometer/advice/your-home/the-snow-code).

This is about communities helping themselves and each other, and we very much hope that everyone will come on board and help their fellow residents and neighbours in Bourton in winter months. Thank you for your cooperation.

#### Message from the Church for the New Year

#### Winter Blues

Like many of you I am old enough to remember a time before central heating, a time when getting out of the bed felt like entering the Arctic and where ice formed on the inside of windows. I bring it up only because I have been having some issue with heating. I was without central heating at home for about a week because of a faulty three-way valve and then the main church building was out of action one Sunday morning because there was no water in the header-tank. I am pleased to report that both of these issues are resolved now, but it did start me thinking about the people in our society who have no heating.

There are those who although they live in a house with central heating, financial constraints are such that they can't afford to put it on for any period of time. Then of course there are those who are forced, for whatever reason, to live rough, finding shelter in shop doors or the occasional hostel. Having been reminded of the cold this winter I am more struck than ever of our need to help in whatever way we can.

Jesus said this in Matthew's Gospel, "I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine you did for me." This I find very challenging mainly because Jesus identifies so closely with the poor and the outcast that He calls them His brothers and sisters. He also says "whatever we do", so it means that we don't necessarily have to head up big organisations, but it can be something as simple as donating food to the Foodbank or clothes to a charity shop.





We hope to be at the Great Rissington Fete again next year, and if we are would like to invite you all to come along and have a go.



#### Mummers

The Mummers Play is considered to have its origin in some form of very early pagan ceremony to portray the seasonal winter cycle of death and rebirth in the spring. More recently, it has been suggested the plays may only have appeared in the 18<sup>th</sup> Century as there is no written record of them before this date. The plays were passed down by word of mouth, changing over time, as some bits were forgotten, ad-libbed or made more topical. Bourton had its own band of mummers who performed up until the First World War.

Most plays were performed around the Christmas period. An essential purpose of the costume was to hide the wearer's identity from the audience. The performances took place either outside or in places such as public houses and inns – anywhere where there was an open space.

There was no "acting" as such, the characters stood back, stepped forward to say their lines and then stepped back again. The only real action took place during the fight. Then, once the champion was dead, the doctor was called to revive him. He might use a hammer, saw, pincers – any tool more likely found in a workshop rather than a doctor's surgery. After the "cure" the extra characters stepped forward and said their lines, usually finishing up with a song and dance. At the end, a collection of money was sought from the spectators by the mummers.

### Bourton 10k 25<sup>th</sup> February

Bourton Roadrunners hosts its annual 10k race at 10.30am on 25<sup>th</sup> February. We're always very grateful to Bourton residents for their patience and tolerance for the disruption this causes to village life.

This year, we're expecting more than 600 runners and their supporters so we can expect increased traffic before and after the race. We've instructed people to use the pay and display car parks and not to find street parking or park at the leisure centre.

We have permission to close the roads in the inner village loop (Victoria Street, Letch Lane and Sherborne Street) from 9.30am to midday and the High Street will be closed from 10am to midday. The Rissington Road will be closed from 10.30am to 11am (eastbound) and from 10.30 until about 11.30am (westbound).

We'd be extremely grateful if people could avoid driving at these times but if you do need to leave the village, please follow the instructions of one of the many marshals who'll do their best to help.

For those wanting to watch the race, and some of Gloucestershire's finest athletes in action, we'd recommend walking along the Rissington Road for a longer, uninterrupted view. The middle of the High Street, where the race starts and finishes, can get very congested and we need to keep the route clear for finishers from about 11am to 11.45am.

This year, we're supporting the Sam Pilcher Trust and donating 50% of the entry fees to this cause. We're hoping to have representatives from the trust on the day so do please come along and find out a bit more about the work they do to support families of children with cancer.
