# PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

#### Parish Council Notes – Council Meeting 6<sup>th</sup> December 2017

**Allotments**: A number of tenants have already indicated they wish to give up plots in 2018 which means that plots will definitely be available for new tenants to take on. Interested residents are asked to contact the Council so these can be reallocated without delay.

**Riverside Walk**: Works to improve the verge between Sherborne and Victoria St by laying part-cobbled matting, part-turf are scheduled to begin 2<sup>nd</sup> January, weather permitting. The works will progress along the Walk so only the section being worked on at any given time will be partially closed. The works should take approximately 4 weeks to complete but will be weather dependent, so please bear with us. During the same period, the area of cobbled matting and railings by the Jubilee sign on the Green will be slightly extended; a compound will be located on the Green for both sets of work. A donation towards these costs has been made by Longborough Devts, for which thanks are given. The Council would appreciate any further donations from local businesses towards the cost of this project which will significantly improve the village centre setting for residents and visitors alike.

**Cemetery**: On balance, the Council felt it was advisable to monitor the situation regarding the Cemetery car park during the winter evenings and will review whether the vehicular gate should be locked when the evenings become lighter. Many families naturally wish to leave tributes, such as wreaths, on graves over the Christmas period. The Council would be grateful if families would ensure these are removed after a suitable interval to help keep the Cemetery in good and tidy condition.

Station Rd Pedestrian crossings: There has been some confusion amongst residents as to why the pedestrian crossing opposite the new Co-Op store has been taken out of commission. It appears that, due to an oversight (not, we hasten to add, by Bourton Parish Council), the necessary legal permission was not put in place prior to its construction. This is now being rectified by a mandatory period of consultation but unfortunately the crossing cannot formally be brought into use until this has been completed. In the meantime, drivers are asked to be aware that pedestrians are likely to still cross at this point and to allow safe passage. Residents have also advised that some drivers are not respecting the traffic lights at the crossing by Meadow Way. In the interests of safety drivers are asked to take extra care at both crossings on Station Rd and to always stop at a red light.

**Silver Jubilee DVD:** A DVD is now available of the celebrations in Bourton in 1977 commemorating the Queen's Silver Jubilee. Please refer to the separate article in this edition for more information.

## ALL ABOUT PROBUS

Regular readers of the Browser will have seen reports and articles about Probus, but may not



have registered what Probus stands for. The Probus Club movement was formed in the United Kingdom in 1965. The name is an amalgam of the words Professional and Business and is used for local clubs for retired or semi-retired business or professional men. There are now over 2,000 clubs worldwide.

Each Probus Club is autonomous. The club endeavours to be simple in structure, be free of the constraints and obligations of service clubs and involve members in a minimal cost. The club is directed primarily to providing fellowship between members who are compatible with each other, and the opportunity for development of acquaintance. Many Probus Clubs are restricted to men, but some clubs have since the introduction of the Equality Act 2010 in the UK started to become mixed and some are women only. It is normal for the spouses of club members and widows of former members to be encouraged to participate in the social activities.

There used to be two Probus clubs in Bourton but they joined together a few years ago under the name Bourton-on-the-Water Probus and have about 30 regular members attending the fortnightly Monday meetings at the George Moore Centre, Moore Road. After the usual business and refreshments, members hear a guest speaker. Subjects are very varied, ranging from the Story of Radar, the Fire Service, Understanding Heraldry, the Krays, History of the Music Hall, the Iron Curtain, etc once there was a live demonstration by a belly dancer!

And there are periodic lunches and dinners.

## Message from the Church for the New Year

Usually you hear them before you see them. The unmistakable excited calls one to another, and then there they are in V formation vigorously winging across the sky, a sight like no other and always a thrill, catching the imagination and lifting the heart.

Wild geese in full flight.....

Wild Goose was the image used by the Celtic church to represent the Holy Spirit. In full flight there is a tremendous sense of purpose .. " Where have they come from?"....." Where are they going?" They seem to have no doubt even if we don't know ....

According to Jesus this kind of mysterious energy is typical of anyone spiritually alive. He said " the wind blows wherever it wills.You hear the sound of it but you cannot tell where it comes from or where it is going. So is anyone born of the Spirit". He also said that the purpose of the Spirit is to lead us into truth. " When the Spirit comes he (or possibly she - the Greek Word Spirit in the Gospel is feminine) will lead you into all the truth..."

So, like the geese we are engaged on a vigorous quest. #### NEWS FROM THE COTSWOLD SCHOOL

The lead up to December is always a rush, so it's good to have a recap of the many goings on and to take a step back to absorb the effort, talent and dedication:-

The Upper Sixth Form's production of 'Into the Woods', a book by James Lapine and music and lyrics by Stephen Sondheim, was a great success with a blend of several fairy tale stories, combined to give a delightful comic story. Lewis White, Year 13, was Director and even had to step in on evening 2 when the main character, Jack, was unwell! Well done to all the cast on both evenings. It was phenomenal. Thank you to The Cotswold School PTA for running the bar over the two consecutive evenings.

On Monday 4 December 2017, Year 8s attended the Gloucestershire Schools' Christmas STEM Lecture at the Bacon Theatre in Cheltenham. This annual spectacular show is organised in a bid to inspire and engage inquisitive young minds.

We held our first all House Debating Competition which were won by:

Key Stage 5: Zeus for 'This House would ban religious symbols in public'

Key Stage 5: Artemis for 'This House would deny public platforms to individuals holding extreme views'

Key Stage 4: Poseidon for 'This House would ban fast food chains from advertising in relation to sport or sports people' Key Stage 4: Zeus for 'This House would legalise cannabis in the UK'

Key Stage 3: Apollo for 'This House would ban the use of animal testing for medical purposes'

Key Stage 3: Poseidon for 'This house would reverse the ban on fox hunting'

Well done to Harry Smith, Year 9, and to all the other entrants in our design competition for a new Sports, Events & Wellbeing pavilion - they were all fantastic and all have received book vouchers, merits and will spend time with the architects in 2018. So far over £15,000 has been raised as part of our £100,000 over 10 months.

The new Sixth Form building opened in November 2017, thus doubling the space available and providing a spacious new first floor study room with 60 new PCs and plenty of extra desk space. On the ground floor is the common room with a fullyfitted kitchen and space to work on joint projects. Mr White, Head of Sixth Form comments, "This is already making a real difference in terms of their independent study and their ability to relax and enjoy the social side of school life - feedback from the students is very positive - they love the atmosphere, which is really helping them with their research and their learning."

In November, we held our Chemistry Week: - Monday was chromatography of sweets, Tuesday was mixing and measuring bath bombs, Wednesday was a 'demo off' between teachers and sixth formers, Thursday was bouncy ball making and Friday was the day to test the bath bombs!

Also in November, Year 10 Sports Youth Leaders were invited to Northleach Church of England Primary School for a day of refereeing at their Winter Games – it was a lovely event. Our Geographers hit the road at 6.30am on 10<sup>th</sup> November for a fieldwork trip to Chesil Beach. They were joined by the Leeson House Field Studies Centre, who were able to show the students the coastal landforms and processes which are being created along the Jurassic Coastline. While at Chesil Beach, the students completed beach-profiles and put their fieldwork skills into action. They even got a personalised weather forecast from the @MetOffice on Twitter (it stayed dry)!

#### **TRIP TO THE BATTLEFIELDS** IN THE WORDS OF 2 STUDENTS: -

Tisa Maunder-Bushell, Year 9 reports: October 2017 saw a group of approximately 40 pupils from Year 9 embark on the annual Cotswold School Battlefields trip. This 3-day trip is perhaps the most significant in the School trips calendar from an educational and personal perspective. The packed 3-day itinerary saw us go to Tyne Cot, the biggest World War One war cemetery, to Beaumont-Hamel Battlefield and to the Canadian trenches. Not only was this an amazing opportunity for us to expand our knowledge about World War One, but also really bring it to life in a very personal way, and I know I won't be forgetting it anytime soon. I would really recommend this trip to anyone, whether or not you are looking to do History GCSE, because you can't explain the emotions you feel looking and learning about the thousands of soldiers who died fighting for their country.

Callum Woolley, Year 9 reports: We started the trip off by travelling through the Eurotunnel into France before driving up into Belgium. During the trip we visited many:

-Cemeteries such as Tyne Cot,

-Battlegrounds such as Newfoundland,

-Large memorials like the Menin Gate, Thiepval and Vimy Ridge

-Trenches such as Vimy Memorial Park

We also went to many other fascinating yet saddening places. For example, in Poperinge we visited a building taken over by the British. It was used to hold British soldiers who disobeyed orders or broke the law. Some soldiers were held there for extremely petty crimes like stealing bread. We saw the post they could see from their cell windows - the post to which they would be strapped prior to being shot the next morning. In the cells, the soldiers scratched graffiti into the walls - pictures that reminded them of home, things they found calming and messages to their loved ones. The next morning, they would be tied to a post and 8 men (most of whom would have known the soldier) would aim their rifles and shoot at the white cloth place around the position of the soldier's heart. 1 rifle contained blanks - so the soldiers could live in hope that they had the blanks and did not, in fact, shoot. This made us all realise the true horror and inhumanity the First World War brought on and showed us the overwhelming amount of fear and awful conditions soldiers had to endure. We also visited a kind of medical dugout near a battlefield where soldier John McCrae wrote the famous poem 'In Flanders Field'. The conditions were horrifying, the mud cement ceilings hanging no higher than 5 foot. Soldiers would have lain there with life threatening injuries and little medical attention, thinking of their impending death and their family back home. This was also incredibly saddening and really made us all think of how the soldier's poems represent all the emotions they felt. Every fear and hope squashed into a single page of writing.

When we visited Lochnagar Crater we were even more shocked. At the start of the battle of the Somme the British set up hundreds of mines along the German trenches. After they were set off – the British would walk across No man's land and gun down any Germans left. The British soldiers were told that after the mines had exploded not so much as a rat would be left. When the bombs went off, the vast crater was created. Yet, the strongly-built German trenches were barely affected and the thousands of British soldiers walking across the flat No man's land were gunned down by German artillery. We were in awe, the huge crater seemed the size of two football pitches.

The thought of the thousands of young men walking across the field in front of us being massacred was terrifying and provoked

deep thought and a silence befell us all as we contemplated the amount of horrific death that happened where we stood. In fact, only sev-



eral years ago a school group came to Lochnagar crater and found a boot sticking out of the ground, only to find it was a soldier who fought and died in the Somme. It was a great experience and taught us masses about World War 1 as well as showing us the conditions that the soldiers, on both the sides, of the Allies and Central Powers, had to live through. Additionally, the trip was full of fascinating places to visit and we visited around 5 places a day.

#### **News from the Primary School**

Happy New Year. It is hard to believe that 2018 is upon us already. With the frantic end to 2017 that every Christmas brings in school, added to by bouts of snow and ice, it is nice to be back to some kind of normality.

This month we begin our new topics across the school. 'Survival' in Year 5 and 6, 'Space' in Year3 and 4 and 'Buildings' in the infants; each of which promise to be fun and fact filled.

It is a short half term, with only 6 weeks to pack everything in. We will continue to visit the Greystones Trust, to look at wildlife, visualise our heritage and record the changes over the year. Furthermore, we will be in the village for various experiences and would love feedback on our behaviour.

The new school hall, canteen and kitchen work is well underway which is really positive, although the lack of a Hall may make PE a little colder than usual as we will be outside rather than in. The Scouts have very kindly offered their hall in an emergency. Here is to you and yours in 2018.

## COMMUNITY LED PLANS

Here is a brief outline of the community-led plans and the community design statement. If you would like more detail, please go to the GRCC website: www.grcc.org.uk/community-led-planning/community-led-planning.

#### <u>Parish Plan</u>

A Parish Plan is a statement of how the community sees itself developing over the next 5 to 10 years. It reflects the views of the community as a whole and focuses on community action. It can also be a precursor to a Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP), and whilst a Parish Plan is not a legal document it can be used as a valid source of information in planning processes. The real value of a Parish Plan is to set out the Parish vision and objectives together with a realistic action plan to tackle community priorities.

#### **Community Design Statements (CDS)**

A Community Design Statement specifies the distinctive design and character of the community setting. A CDS gives people the opportunity to learn more about the place where they live, and what they value and want to conserve and enhance. It focuses on the form and character of new developments <u>not</u> on whether or not development should take place. However, having a CDS provides for some influence on the Local Plan (developed by the local District Council) to help preserve the community's unique personality. A CDS can exist alongside another plan. An earlier Conservation Area Statement [dated 2002] can be found here: www.cotswold.gov.uk/residents/planning-building/historic-buildings-conservation-areas/conservation-area-maps-and-appraisals.

#### Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP)

An NDP focuses specifically on shaping new development, so it is based on land use and planning issues, such as the design of buildings, affordable housing, sites for shops and play areas. The Plan must accord in all respects with the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) and **cannot be used to prevent development**. It does however provide for the community to have its say as to the type, scale and location of development within the settlement. The Plan holds a legal status, and once adopted by the Parish Council it must be recognised by the Local Planning Authority. NDP's do not address non-planning issues such as speeding, littering etc.

An NDP is a significant community undertaking, which takes approximately 3 to 5 years with the process involving several consultation stages, an examination and a final referendum before the NDP can become a statutory document. It is therefore important to assess whether it's the right way forward, and that the people and resources are available to create it.

## Results of the Christmas Jumper Bunting Competition

When we arrived at GMCC on Monday 4<sup>th</sup> December for the judging of this competition we were delighted and astonished to find 298 jumpers. This number has increased since to over 300! Of these 120 competition entries were received from children and about 30 from adults. Meaning that half the jumpers were just contributed just for fun. As all the entries from children fitted into the under 7s category, (we had no entries for under 11s or under 18s, classes 4 and 5) the prizes that would have gone to those were re allocated to the under 7s as runner up prizes.

Our judges were Julie and Trevor the owners of "Bourton Basket" haberdashery and craft shop in Moore Rd. The 150 entries gave them a lot to chose from and it took them some while to make their decisions. They were so impressed that it was decided to award some Highly Commended prizes as well. We would like to thank Julie and Trevor for doing this voluntarily for the community. The results are as follows:

#### **Knit a Poppy**

Needles 4mm, No 8

#### <u>Petals</u>

(knit 4) Using red wool cast on 5 stitches.



Row 1: (RS) K. Row 2: KFB, (knit forward and back into next stitch), K to last 2 stitches, KFB, K1 (7 stitches). Row 3: as 2nd row (9 stitches). Row 4: as 2nd row (11 stitches). Row 5—8: knit. Row 9: SL1, K2 tog. PSSO, K to last 4 stitches, K 2 tog. Twice (7 stitches) Row 10—12: knit Row 13: as 9th row (3 stitches) Row 14: cast off

Using black wool cast on 16 stitches. Cast off. Leaf (knit 1) using green wool, cast 4 stitches. Row 1: K Row 2: KFB, K to last stitch, KFB (6 stitches) Row 3: K Row 4: as 2nd row (8 stitches) Row 5-8: K Row 9: K 2 tog, K to last 2 stitches, K 2 tog (6 stitches) Row 10: K Row 11: as 9th row (4 stitches) Row 12: K Row 13: as 9th row (2 stitches) Row 14: cast off Weave in the ends of the petals, assemble

Weave in the ends of the petals, assemble the petals into a circle and use the ends to sew them together. Coil the black into a circle and sew in the centre of the petals.

Weave in the ends of the leaf and sew onto the back of the petals. Sew on the pin.
