### PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

### Parish Council Notes – Council Meeting 1<sup>st</sup> August 2018

**Springvale Allotments:** The lease on the Springvale allotment site was due for renewal in May this year; it had been leased to the Council for the previous 7 years. Although the lease has been renewed for a further period of 7 years, CDC has inserted a clause giving it the opportunity to break the lease after 2 years in the event the site is required for housing. Whilst the Parish Council objected to this clause, it has been obliged to renew under these terms; however, it would be very reluctant to lose this local amenity, and will keep residents notified in the event the break clause is triggered at any time after May 2020 so they may also have the opportunity to comment on any housing development application on this land.

**Christmas Tree and Street Lights display:** Following the disbanding of the local Chamber of Commerce earlier this year the Parish Council has now agreed to take on responsibility for providing the Christmas Tree and Street Light display, as this display is enjoyed by many residents as well as visitors. This year's display will be the last which will be part-funded by Chamber monies.

**Station Rd crossing:** GCC has submitted a proposal for a new zebra crossing to be installed on Station Rd to the east of the entrances to Melville and Honeystones (by the site of the former bus-stop, outside The Lawns). This will provide another safe crossing point at this location where there is no continuous footpath between Honeystones and the village centre on the south side of the road.

Automatic Number Plate Reader (ANPR): The Council has approved the partfunding of ANPR equipment to be installed locally. Local councils elsewhere in the Cotswolds have found that traffic speeds have been considerably reduced once this equipment has been installed (up to nearly 40% reduction in some areas). The data captured belongs to the local council but can be monitored by local Speedwatch teams, and can assist the Police in their actions to reduce speeding. Data can also be remotely accessed by the Police and used in the investigation and prosecution of other crimes. Now that funds have been approved in principle, the Council will be working with various authorities to ensure it's installed in the most suitable location.

**VC Commemoration**: Preparations for the event on 10<sup>th</sup> November continue to be progressed, and these will include the prior repair of part of the low boundary wall surrounding the existing War Memorial. Details of the commemoration will be made available in September/October.

**Staffing:** As a result of its expansion of activities within the Community Centre, the Council has approved the engagement of a Finance Officer to deal solely with the Council's expanding accounting responsibilities. The new officer will begin in October.

### **Automatic Number Plate Recognition**

At the August Parish Council meeting it was agreed to purchase an ANPR (Automatic Number Plate Recognition) Camera for the Village along with a large donation from Gloucestershire County Councils Highway Local Grant as recommended by County Councillor Paul Hodgkinson. The ANPR camera will record vehicle registration, location, time and speed and the camera data will be collated and passed to the Police so that motorists who drive at excessive speeds will be subject to appropriate follow up action by the Police.

The Camera is movable so can be positioned in a variety of places in the village - the exact location for it's first siting is currently being decided as part of the overall installation plan. In the meantime, drivers should note that the 20mph and 30mph speed limits in the Parish [including Lansdowne, The High Street, Sherborne Street, Moore Road and Station Road] are mandatory, and drivers should drive in accordance with these limits.

Bourton Roadrunners—Bourton 1 mile Challenge



The Bourton One Mile Challenge has built up a tremendous reputation over the years and always attracts top athletes from near and far to enter into this one mile sprint as, lungs bursting, they give all they can to beat their fellow competitors.

A hard fought battle for the finish line saw Richard de Camps of Cheltenham & County Harriers in 4.22 just manage to hold off International Cardiff AAC athlete, James Thie 4.23 and Ben Robinson 4.23 of Bristol & West. As always, the pace was hot from start to finish



and the flat point to point course was lined with spectators encouraging the tremendous efforts put in by all the runners from start to finish.

The ladies' race was no less competitive, with just 3 seconds between the first 5 finishers: Rachel Coupe of Telford AC crossed the line first in 5.28, with Annabel Roberts, Tewkesbury RC, 5.30 in hot pursuit, tying with 13 year old Kiya Dee of Bourton Roadrunners for 2nd place and following just one second behind Hayley Winters of Gloucester AC and Stephanie Lane, Unattached in the same time of 5.31.



An emotional finish by Felix Thompson of Bourton Roadrunners 26.24, accompanied by his mum to cross the line brought spontaneous cheers from the crowd and just summed up what the race is all about in achieving targets in many different guises.

This will go towards a piece of equipment called an OSCAR, which is used to remove bone cement (within minutes) when a patient's hip replacement needs replacing, hopefully maintaining a happy and active life for many people.



### **Community Governance Review Consultation**

A number of residents have been confused by the letter sent out in July by Cotswold District Council on the above, and have asked the Parish Council to provide a brief explanation of this, in layman's terms.

In 2013 Cotswold District Council (CDC) made changes to the areas for which their Ward Councillors are responsible. A Ward Councillor's role is to represent their Ward and the people who live in it, and provide a link between that community and CDC. At that time, Bourton's sole Ward Councillor was Len Wilkins, a long-standing Ward Councillor who will be well known to many of you.

CDC wished to make changes to the boundaries so that each Ward Councillor represented roughly the same number of residents (ideally, about 2,000 electors). Unfortunately, as Bourton's population had become so large, in order to do so CDC had to split our village into 2 different Wards – Bourton Village, and Bourton Vale (which also includes some other small outlying villages), both of which would have about 2,000 electors each. In 2015 Len Wilkins was elected Ward Cllr for Bourton Village and Richard Keeling was elected Ward Cllr for Bourton Vale.

Bourton Parish Council retained the same number of parish councillors as before (11) but, on paper only, 8 were now "allocated" to Bourton Village Ward and 3 to Bourton Vale Ward. This made no difference within parish council meetings in which all councillors discussed and voted on all matters relating to both Bourton Wards.

Residents then discovered at the 2015 local elections that residents in Bourton Village were unable to vote in the Bourton Vale elections, and vice versa. This was obviously far from ideal, and many were unaware this would be the case until turning up to vote and being refused permission to do so. As this effectively prevented residents from voting for councillors who would be representing them within the Parish Council, the Parish Council asked CDC to reverse the split <u>parish</u> ward arrangement. It agreed to do so, but had to wait till now to make these changes.

This is what residents are now being consulted on, so that any changes can be completed before the next round of local elections in May 2019.

If you support the reversal of the split parish ward arrangement, whereby Bourton Vale and Bourton Village Ward will still be represented by different Ward Councillors, but all residents within Bourton parish get to vote for all Bourton parish councillors in future local elections then you should answer "Yes" to question 4.

If you wish to retain the present arrangement (whereby you will be unable to vote for parish councillors in the "other" Bourton Ward in future elections) then you should answer "No" to that question.

We hope this goes some way to helping clarify the purpose of CDC's letter. We also trust residents will support the Parish Council in seeking a reversal of the split parish Ward arrangement, so that all residents wherever they live in Bourton have equal voting rights in future Parish Council elections.

### 10 Things You Might Not Know About Our Ducks

Here in Bourton-on-the-Water, we're lucky to have a resident population of ducks. Here's a set of Questions & Answers about them:

- 1. What's the name of the type of duck we have living in Bourton? Answer: We have a breed called, 'Mallard' in the village. They were once a very common duck but, like many of our birds & wildlife, are sadly, in decline (RSPB – 'Amber LIST' 2018).
- 2. How can you usually tell the difference between the adult MALE and adult FE-MALE ducks? Answer: The male mallard usually has a wonderful green head and a bright yellow beak. The female has speckled brown feathers and a brown beak – this helps her hide from predators when she has ducklings to look after. In summer, the males change their feathers and look like the females for a while!
- 3. What are the types of natural food that the ducks eat in and around the river? Answer: They eat the weed they find in ponds & rivers. Also insects, grubs & worms plus grasses & seeds.
- 4. What types of food can we give the ducks? Answer: Although it is probably

best not to feed them as they can become dependent upon us, if we do feed them, the best things are: bird seed, peas, grapes cut in half & special, floating swan & duck food. Some village shops sell duck food.

- 5. What foods are bad for them? Answer: Bread, cakes, pastries & anything else not found in their natural environment. Bread (cakes/pastries) are particularly bad for them, it is like us eating sweets all day. It is 'junk' food & can make them very sick. Bread is especially bad for baby birds as it makes their tummies very poorly & means they can't eat the food they need to grow.
- 6. How long do the ducks usually live for? Answer: In the wild, the ducks only live for 3-5 years. Although some birds may live longer. The oldest ever duck recorded in the Guinness World Records was called Desi and she lived to 20 years & 3 months!
- 7. When does the female lay her eggs and how many does she lay? Answer: The female lays her eggs between mid-March and the end of July. She will normally lay about 12 eggs and she will sit on them to protect them from predators.
- 8. How long before the eggs hatch? Answer: It takes about 28 days for the eggs to hatch and the ducklings to be born.



- 9. How long does it take the ducklings to become independent from their Mums? Answer: Although the ducklings can walk, swim& find their own food as soon as they are born, they cannot fly & rely on their Mum for protection & shelter. They are very tiny in the first few weeks & this means they can be attacked by lots of different predators or suffer from bad weather if they can't find their Mums to help keep them warm & safe.
- 10.**How old are the ducklings when they can fly?** *Answer: It takes them between 60-90 days to grow their wings & to be able to fly.*

Work Clubs are available across the UK and provide IT facilities, training and support to help unemployed people to find a job. The GEM project (Go the Extra Mile) is funded by The Big Lottery and the European Social Fund and aims to help over 1,000 people remove the barriers which are preventing them from finding work.

The North Cotswolds Work Club is now available for a 3-month trial period at the Moreton Area Centre, High Street, Moreton-in-Marsh on Friday mornings 10.30am to 12.30pm. There will be 6 laptops, a printer, IT support and help from volunteers to undertake on-line job searches, complete job application forms, write letters and create a CV. Additional expert help with benefits, debt, housing, training and volunteering experience can also be arranged for attendees. There is no charge to attend the Work Club or use any of the Club's facilities. Amanda Howard CEO of Cotswold Friends said, "Looking for work can be a very lonely and isolating experience. Many of us are having to work for longer as pensions start later and the cost of living rises. If you don't have access to a computer and a printer to create and print job applications, letters and CVs; if you haven't looked for work for a long time and need advice about CV creation or letter writing; if you aren't familiar with the internet and using on-line search engines to find job vacancies, then finding work can seem impossible. Not only does the Work Club provide these facilities, and support to use them, but also encouragement, peer support and camaraderie from a group of people who all face the same challenges. This kind of support can grow confidence and can make a big difference to not only the experience of looking for work but also to the successful outcome of finding a suitable role."

### Health Connect A Community Development Project in

Bourton-on-the-Water

The Healthy Communities Team of Cotswold District Council has been commissioned to deliver a place-based community development project in Bourton. This is part of a countywide initiative where each of the six District Councils in Gloucestershire have identified a priority area in which to deliver focused community development work to promote health and wellbeing. This work compliments existing county-wide communitybased initiatives to help reduce the gap in health and wellbeing among local communities. The overall aim of the project is to support individuals to have the knowledge, skills and confidence to self-care and live in well-connected, resilient and empowered communities. The project is being funded by Public Health and Gloucestershire Clinical Commissioning Group for a period of 2 years until December 2020.

During the first six months of the project, the Healthy Communities Team has done some extensive research in order to identify local health needs and establish a baseline community health status as well as to identify local assets. We had numerous conversations with local residents and stakeholders in order to find out more about Bourton and local needs and a steering group as well as smaller work groups have been established which meet regularly at the George Moore Community Centre. We are working closely with our partners such as the local Schools, Parish Council, Cotswold Friends and Greystones Farm in order to develop ideas and initiatives to strengthen the local community and to improve people's Wellbeing. A big Health & Wellbeing Event is planned for 21<sup>st</sup> October where we aim to bring together the local community and support groups and which will be the start for a wider consultation with Bourton residents. The event will be promoted widely soon.
