We are actually very grateful to our regular advertisers who have, in almost all cases, allowed us to keep any prepayments ready to use once we can get back into normal production. have been disrupted.

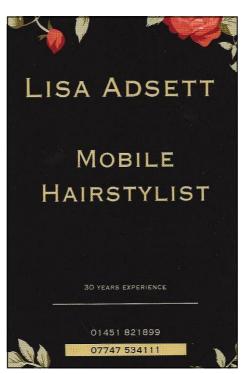

So with movements restricted, we've found different ways to hold meetings and keep the cubs going. Monday night saw the biggest online turnout yet, with 11 cubs logging on for an astronomy based meeting. Armed with torches, paper cups and tin foil they created constellations – some of them recognisable to earth based astronomers, but many from galaxies far, far away.

Online meetings are still taking a bit of getting used to, as noone really likes sitting in a chair for half an hour looking at a screen, especially as the leader is no YouTube star. But we are doing our best and improving with each meeting. The early technical difficulties of connecting to a meeting are now becoming the more advanced issues, such as choosing an exotic back drop, with many cubs now able to travel from their lounge or kitchen to Australia, then to San Francisco and home again in such little time even Dr. Who would be impressed.

There's still so much going on. The Nights Away badge can be earned at home, indoors by making a den. Some cubs have virtually moved into their constructions and are racking up the nights away. We're setting challenges for ourselves, such as learning to tie knots over the internet, and ticking off badge requirements towards Home Help and Animal Carer. On a wider view, as part of the 'Big Day In' for Comic Relief, the scouts are trying to walk to the moon, covering the distance to the moon between them by walking a mile. For some that means several laps of the garden!

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Bourton Primary School

Some of the children aged approximately 7 to 9 years old, in school today, discussed with me some of the questions they had about Covid19.

Their questions were as follows:

1. How long until this all stops / how long will it last?

Scientists, doctors and politicians are working hard to get an answer but we just don't know. We have to develop a vaccine, and give it to nearly everyone, before we can get back to normal totally.

2. How many days until school opens again?

School has always been open for some students. The rest should be able to return to school in coming weeks although we don't know when yet. Mr Jones is making plans to keep students and staff safe. The Prime Minister will tell us when all schools can reopen.

<u>3. If a family member has the virus and I don't live with them, can I go and help look after them?</u>

I'm sorry that your family member is sick with the virus. Sadly no, at the moment it's not safe for you to visit them. Keeping away keeps you safe and it also makes sure the virus can't spread to other people.

4. If you live next door to someone who has the virus and your washing is out in the garden, if they cough, can you catch it?

Almost definitely not. You probably have a fence and your washing will be 2 metres or more away. If your neighbour is sick with the virus, it is unlikely they'll be in the garden. Keep washing your hands. If you are in any doubt, you can always choose to do your washing again. The risk is very very small.

We have been open every week day since school closed, including the bank holiday Friday and Monday. We are doing some of the work set by the teachers, but we are also being as active and creative as we can be! We have created lots of rainbows that we have displayed on the windows to the hall, so anyone walking past can see them! If you have any further questions, please remember you can email school or ask your teacher.

Cotswold Friends adapts services to continue support Over 2,000 people are being sup-



ported by amazing Cotswold Friends volunteers and staff. Charity services have been adapted in light of recent Government restrictions due to Coronavirus. Telephone Befriending, shopping, pharmacy deliveries and transport for vital journeys are all in place and fully operational. If you would like to volunteer or use any of the services contact Cotswold Friends.

Community Transport

All vulnerable Members of the Transport Service are receiving a telephone call. Vital journeys can still be accommodated. People who use the service for their food shopping are being offered a food shopping delivery service. Transport Booking Desk volunteers are making regular calls to support all vulnerable transport Members and arranging shopping deliveries if needed. The Wheelchair Accessible Vehicle remains available for use and the delivery of medication from pharmacies can be arranged.

Befriending, Carer Respite and Memory Club

Volunteers are now Telephone Befriending the people they support, in place of their usual face to face visits. This will ensure clients have continued contact with their volunteers, helping to reduce loneliness and isolation and allowing support needs to be monitored and reviewed. Any shopping needs or medication deliveries are being arranged.

Community Activities

Volunteers are Telephone Befriending people who normally attend Community Activities. Some of the pubs where Cotswold Friends Lunch Clubs are held have offered to cook meals to be delivered to people at home. Shopping and medication deliveries are being arranged as needed.

Update from the District Councillor,

Bourton-on-the-Water Village Ward

Waste Collection: Despite some staff absences, kerbside waste collections are scheduled to continue largely as normal. However, the collection of garden waste (green wheelie bins) remains suspended as the available crews and vehicles are being used to deliver and support the main collections.

With more people at home, waste volumes are very high resulting in occasional service failures as vehicles reach capacity and run out of time to undertake all the tips necessary. So if your waste is not collected please report it to CDC (preferably using the form on the website to reduce pressure on the telephone lines) and leave it out for a catch-up collection.

CDC have also asked for residents to Reduce, Reuse, Recycle (in that order!) to help manage the service by reducing waste volumes.

It also helps crews to work more speedily if you can ensure that waste is presented in the right containers. Main changes to remember are that:

- Food waste can no longer be put into garden waste bins, but goes in the separate food caddy.
- •You should now use your current white recycling bag for tins, cans, empty aerosols, clean foil, plastic bottles, tubs, punnets, pots, trays and NEW cartons (Tetra Pak).

Thank you for not lighting bonfires during this difficult time.

Business Grants: Cotswold District Council is making good progress in processing grant payments to local businesses affected by the coronavirus outbreak. The Council has identified more than 2,500 eligible businesses in the district to which it will be looking to make payments, but is still awaiting key information from many.

To ensure that businesses get their grants as quickly as possible, CDC are requesting all businesses that meet the criteria to fill out and return the 'Apply for a Business Grant' form on the website.

Can I end by congratulating all the Bourton Street Volunteers for the amazing work that they continue to do in supporting the elderly and vulnerable. Managing this crisis depends heavily on the generosity and goodwill of all of us in the local community. Thank you.

Street Volunteer Support for Animals

Bourton Street Volunteers (BSV)

Pets can be a great source of comfort in these difficult times. For some, they are the only company people have whilst they isolate themselves at home.

We understand how important your furry friends are and Street Volunteers can help in the following ways:

- We can pick up prescriptions from your normal vet for you. Please contact your Street Volunteer and give them the name of the animal and which vet practice you use. You will also need to tell them your name and address, and details of what drug is to be collected.
- 2. We can transport pets to your vet. Some Street Volunteers are able to provide animal transport. Do bear in mind however that vets are only seeing animals when absolutely essential. For minor problems, vets are doing consultations over the phone. So, talk to your vet first. (It is worth noting that vets are not generally carrying out routine vaccinations of pets until after the restrictions are over).
- 3. We can walk your dogs. If you fall ill or are unable to leave your house for some other reason, we can make sure your dog gets a walk. Just contact your local Street Volunteer and they will organise for someone used to handling dogs to walk them on a lead. Please make us aware if your dog is fearful of anything (for example, traffic or other dogs).

Finally, do consider having some kind of contingency plan for your pets in place in case you fall ill or go into hospital. Perhaps a neighbour or relative could look after them. It's worth making some notes for a foster carer of what food your cat or dog eats and when and how far you normally walk it and de-



tails of things it likes (e.g. walks, ball games) and dislikes (e.g. gunshots).

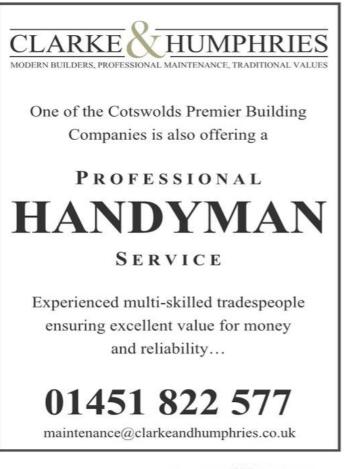

PROBUS

Bourton-on-the-Water



Owing to self isolation there

has not been any activity on which to report so I am offering a short history of the club and how it got its name.

Probus clubs are made up of retired or semi-retired people who have held posts of responsibility in the business or pro-fessional world.

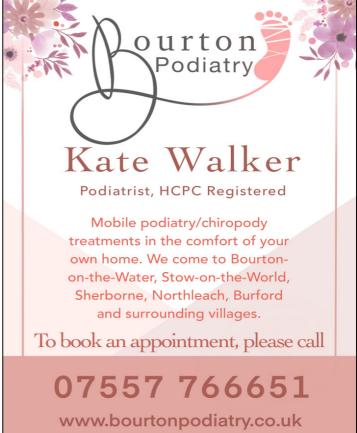
The name is an amalgam of the abbreviation of the words professional and business. Probus is also a Latin word meaning honest or virtuous, from which the English word 'probity' is derived.

Each Probus Club is autonomous. There is no central organisation and each club sets its own rules. Probus magazine, published quarterly, is the only national publication enabling clubs to communicate, share experiences and ask for or impart advice.

The Probus Club movement was formed in the United Kingdom in 1965. The Probus movement had its beginnings in two clubs, both created by members of Rotary.

It is widely acknowledged that Probus had its foundation in Welwyn Garden City 55 years ago. It has now spread to many countries throughout the world and has been described by a member in Australia as the best thing that England ever exported.

A man called Fred Carnhill was addicted to cricket, bowls and soccer and on retirement found a conspicuous lack of facilities for men in his situation. He formed a lunch club to serve as a focal point for the development of social activity among men of similar age and background.



The new club had no difficulty attracting members . Telephones rang (no internet then) and enquiries made even before men retired. The news had spread via press reports.

In 1974 Probus expanded into New Zealand and by 1976 the idea spread to Australia. The first Probus club for seniors in North America was sponsored by the Rotary Club of Galt in Cambridge, Ontario, Canada in 1987.

Although Probus membership is greatest in Britain, Australia and New Zealand, clubs today exist in all parts of the world.

In the UK and Ireland it is seen as a strength of the movement that there is no central organising body so each club sets its own rules, the watchword being informality.

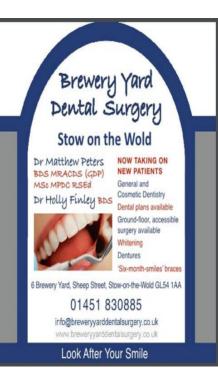
