News from the Parish Council for October Notes from the Parish Council meeting on 3rd September 2025.

Co-Option of new Parish Councillor: We were pleased to receive four applications for the vacant seat and Council co-opted Roger Frampton at the meeting. Councillor Frampton was also co-opted to the Com-

munity and Services Committee.

Finance Committee: Councillor Sharon Coventry was co-opted to this committee.

Coach parking, pick-up and drop-off: County Councillor Paul Hodgkinson updated that the Cotswold School has been unable to progress their plans due to the very high costs involved. There is still a need to expand parking on site as the size of the school has increased so alternative plans are being investigated.

Cllr Hodgkinson was disappointed that the Experimental Traffic Regulation Order at Meadow Way is still not in place as this had been planned to start before the Easter holidays. GCC Highways are now expecting underground electrical cabling to be moved during September which will allow the correct signage to be installed. This will enable the trial to start and the ETRO to become legally enforceable. It is understood that GCC Highways plan for the trial to include the summer of 2026.

Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Funding: The Parish Council is expected to receive around £100,000 in funding from the development at the old Co-Op Site in Station Road, to be received in phased amounts as construction on the site progresses. A strategy was agreed that 50% of these funds will be used towards essential improvements at the grade II listed George Moore Community Centre and the remaining 50% to replace old play equipment at The Naight, for consultancy work to support future burial provision and a biodiversity audit.

Melville outdoor gym equipment: A quote was approved for new equipment to attract adult users to participate in outdoor fitness. Grants have been obtained from Gloucestershire County Council's Build Back Better Fund and the Gloucestershire Playing Fields Association, and the remainder of funding will come from CIL monies already held.

Remembrance Day Parade from 10.30am on Sunday 9th November: The Parish Council and Royal British Legion have arranged a parade and wreath laying at the war memorial and all are invited to attend. Please note that for public safety reasons we have arranged for road closures of the High Street at the junction of Moore Road to the junction with Victoria Street and Sherborne Street from the junction with High Street to the Mill Bridge between 10.30 and 11.30am and this will be marshalled by members of the Rotary Club. Please plan any journeys accordingly to avoid the village centre during this time

Statement on actions taken by the Parish Council to mitigate the impact of tourism on the village: It was agreed to make a written public statement to update on actions taken. Please see the separate statement in the Browser. See page 3.

County Councillor Paul Hodgkinson highlighted that the local government reorganisation now has a definitive timetable, and it is likely that

we will be advised next summer which of the reorganisation models is favoured. May 2027 will be the finish of the current GCC term and there will be elections to determine the shadow unitary authorities. However, this means there will be no new spending in 2027-28 until matters are transferred across.

District Councillor Len Wilkins (Bourton Vale) updated that all seven Gloucestershire District Councils are working to gather feedback on how local services can best meet the needs of residents both now and in the future. Three options are under consideration for the new council structure.

Cotswold District Council is fast-tracking updates to its Local Plan to ensure homes are built in the right place at the right time, after government planning reforms more than doubled the number of houses the district is expected to



deliver.

District Councillor Jon Wareing (Bourton Village) received complaints about waste emptying in the village centre. CDC's contractor was unable to deliver the schedule of emptying three times a day due to staff shortages and times were altered to later in the day during the very busy weeks at the end of August. Parish Councillors met with CDC to discuss problems with collections and the waste produced by local takeaway businesses was being investigated by CDC.

Thames Water is continuing upgrade works at the Rissington Road Sewage Pumping Station, with preliminary activity underway ahead of full planning approval expected later this year. The project, which includes installation of a Rising Main and Gravity Main will require a road crossing at Rissington Road to facilitate connection to the pumping station and this is planned for October 2025. The work aims to improve network resilience and is expected to take 12-18 months to complete. The Thames Water letter to residents advised that they may notice increased noise and vehicle movement during these works, but pedestrian and emergency access will be maintained throughout. The Parish Council will be seeking further clarification on the planned temporary road closure at Rissington Road. 9th September 2025. Statement from Bourton-on-the-Water Parish Council:

Update on Tourism Mitigation Measures Bourton-on-the-Water Parish Council wishes to update residents, local businesses, and visitors on the actions being taken to address the growing impact of tourism on our village.

We recognise that the increased visitor numbers this year have placed significant pressure not only on the village centre but also on surrounding residential and commercial areas. While tourism brings economic benefits, it also presents challenges that require coordinated and sustained efforts to be managed effectively.

The Parish Council has limited statutory powers, but we are actively engaging with Cotswold District Council (CDC), Gloucestershire County Council (GCC), and other relevant bodies to advocate for our community's needs and concerns.

Understanding Parish Council Powers

It's important to note that the Parish Council is only responsible for maintaining land and buildings it owns—such as the village green, cemetery, allotments, play areas, and the Community Centre. The Parish Council has no control over visitor numbers and has no power to close the village.

Many of the issues residents raise—such as litter, dog fouling, potholes, street lighting, and road signage-fall under the remit of CDC or GCC. While the Parish Council does work on behalf of residents to raise concerns and push for action on these matters, it is often more effective for individuals to report problems directly to the appropriate authority:

- Environmental issues (e.g. fly-tipping, overflowing bins, graffiti): Visit www.cotswold.gov.uk/environment or call **01285 623000**
- Roads, travel, and parking issues (e.g. potholes, blocked drains, streetlights): Visit fixmystreet.gloucestershire.gov.uk or call **08000 514514**

Alternatively, residents can www.fixmystreet.com to report any issue, which will be forwarded to the relevant authority.

Waste Management

One of the most pressing issues has been the accumulation of litter, particularly from takeaway outlets and picnickers. We met with the Head of Waste and Environment from CDC in August to highlight the severity of the problem. Historically, waste collection occurred three times daily, but this year it was reduced to two collections without prior consultation due to staffing issues. Following our meeting, we received reassurance that weekend collections will return to three per day. We are also initiating discussions with local takeaway businesses to encourage their cooperation in reducing waste. The Parish Council remains committed to achieving a "bin-free" village by 2030, in line with other tourist destinations.

Coach Traffic and the ETRO

We continue to work closely with County Councillor Paul Hodgkinson to progress Gloucestershire County Council Highways' Meadow Way Experimental Traffic Regulation Order (ETRO), aimed at managing coach traffic through the village. Although the scheme was scheduled to begin in April, delays caused by infrastructure issues have postponed its implementation. We are hopeful that GCC Highways will be able to implement the ETRO by the end of September and understand that it is their intention to run the trial for a year until September 2026 to ensure it includes the busiest time during next summer. We would like to highlight that until the correct signage is in place on site, the ETRO scheme is not legally enforceable.

Traffic Management: We are in ongoing discussions with Gloucestershire County Council Highways regarding signage and traffic flow improvements. Despite repeated requests, temporary signage to redirect traffic has not yet been installed and permanent signage still requires replacement on the Fosseway which may have contributed towards traffic problems in the village. We share residents' frustration and will continue to press for timely action.

In addition, we have submitted to Cotswold District Council a request for Tourist Levy funding—generated from the Rissington Road car park-to commission a comprehensive visitor traffic management survey by a professional consultant. This study would assess all forms of transportation and parking, with the aim of improving traffic flow, maximising access to the village for residents and tackling inappropriate visiting parking in residential areas. Should this funding proposal be approved, a full public consultation will be held to ensure community input is central to any future changes. The Parish Council has made several attempts to arrange a residents' parking permit system, but this has not been allowed by Gloucestershire County Council Highways.

Community Involvement

We understand the importance of clear communication and are exploring ways to keep residents informed, including through the website, social media and local publications. We also welcome support from residents who can offer their skills, knowledge, and energy to help us tackle these challenges.

An Organised Voice for Bourton-on-the-Water Residents (3)

This has been an appalling Summer for residents bearing the impact of overtourism in the village with so many examples of appalling behaviour from visitors towards local residents, our natural environment and indeed to the people working for CDC who endeavour to keep Bourton clean.

I have spoken with a number of journalists who are all shocked at what they have witnessed when they have come to Bourton. I think this has been reflected in the media coverage locally, nationally and internationally.

I am happy to report that an initial meeting of 18 local residents, who are keen to be actively involved in establishing a forum for residents, took place at Bourton Rovers Football Club on the 8th September. (Thank you to the Club for hosting us!)

There was a great cross-section of the community represented, a very positive response from all and a great level of energy to develop the group. The frustration with all Councils to consult with, listen to and acknowledge residents' perspectives on the issue of overtourism is very high.

A charter is in development with strong alignment on its principles and a steering group formed. By the time you are reading this I hope that the steering group will have met to develop an agenda, identify work streams and to plan a public meeting.

I can say that, for the first time, I am optimistic that the tide is turning against the resistance to any change in the status quo created by people with vested interests in the tourism economy. These people frankly demonstrate no consideration for the grossly negative impact on local people and the social fabric of our community due to the overtourism and fast

tourism that they welcome.

Just a word on the Meadow Way Coach drop-off and pick-up point. This scheme, which was supposed to start in April, has not yet legally commenced. Coaches have however been using the marked bay in Meadow Way, parking for longer periods than the 10 minutes allowed, using Meadow Way in both directions and even stopping on both sides of the road to obstruct traffic flow. It is a total farce. Meanwhile other coach companies have been dropping off and picking up visitors at all points in the village including the High Street where they are expressly prohibited. This Experimental Traffic Order has already failed.

It is time for the Parish Council to withdraw their support for this poorly conceived scheme and to prioritise the implementation of proposals that were approved at the meeting of 6th March 2024 for exclusion of coaches from central routes in Bourton-on-the-Water, by way of Traffic Regulation Order.

Bourton Probus Club

At our meeting on 8th September, David Head gave us a talk on the Panama Canal. There had been a thought of a waterway as early as the 16th century

but the real stimulus was the Gold Rush of 1849. The two proposals were, one across Nicaragua and the other across Panama, which at the time was part of Colombia. Ferdinand de Leppes, who had built the Suez canal, started to excavate but became bankrupt, leaving a small distance completed. Theodore Roosevelt then stepped in and built the canal, and as a Republican, it has been the desire of all Republican Presidents since to own the canal!

He went on to explain the completion of the canal and it was incredible to think that the boats traversing it only had about 1 foot either side to negotiate the locks under their own steam. They were guided by electrical mules but couldn't risk touching the lock sides as they were concrete. The gates were made of soil. He told us that around 60,000 died, many due to yellow fever, malaria and cholera. He also explained the building of the lakes to keep a steady supply of water for the canal. The workers mainly came from Barbados and the Caribbean. He concluded with pictures of the rare animals seen from the surrounding rivers. All in all, a fascinating talk.

2025 Poppy Appeal

And so Jazz left the cotton fields of slavery to become a respectable music genre.

Message from the Church

Angels

Annually on the 29th September we commemorate St. Michael and All Angels (Michaelmas) and on 2nd October The Holy Guardian Angels. Angels are regularly mentioned throughout the Bible. They are spirits (they do not have a human body like us) but they have intelligence and will, are immortal, and surpass humans in perfection. The name angel means 'messenger'. St. Luke tells us that an angel foretold the future birth of John the Baptist. The angel Gabriel came to visit Mary at the Annunciation. Angels appeared to the shepherds on Christmas Day. They were present with Jesus after his Temptations. An angel speaks to the women at Christ's tomb to announce the Resurrection.

The Book of Revelation explains that there are also 'fallen angels'; who, originally good, of their own free choice rejected God; the most notorious of these being Satan. 'War broke out in heaven,

when Michael with his angels attacked the dragon. The dragon fought back with his angels, but they were defeated and driven out of heaven'.

But what do Christians believe about Guardian Angels? In the 4th century St Basil wrote; 'Beside each believer stands an angel as protector and shepherd leading him to life', something that was confirmed by the Lord, especially in the context of children: See that you never despise any of these little ones, for I tell you that their angels in heaven are continually in the presence of my Father in heaven.'

The knowledge that we have a Guardian Angel reminds us that God cares for and loves us all as individuals, deeply. They are present at our birth, through life and at our death. The presence of the Angels is, then, very much part of our Christian faith and tradition and we should rejoice in the help they give us.

Ghosts of Bourton-on-the-Water

When night falls, Bourton-on-the-Water becomes a different place. For generations, stories have been told of things unseen - and some are still whispered today.

One night in 2014, two brothers set up a camera at St Lawrence's Church. As they worked, they heard footsteps crossing the gravel. A hooded figure appeared on the path - then melted into silence scarcely six feet away. No image was caught, yet the memory of that night lingers like an imprint.

There are also the so-called "murder alleys," narrow shadowed passages running behind the High Street. By day they are simple shortcuts, but after dark walkers speak of a sudden chill, the sense of being pressed in by the walls, and the quick echo of footsteps that vanish when they turn to look. Old lintels bear scratched "witch marks," as if

villagers once tried to ward off something malevolent from slipping through those lanes.

And then there is the Windrush itself. In the 19th century, a boy is said to have tumbled from one of the bridges and was never found. Even now, laughter is sometimes heard drifting along the riverbank, though no child is there to be seen. Some claim to glimpse ripples in the water as if someone unseen had just climbed out.

The Old New Inn carries its own mysteries. Guests speak of unseen hands brushing past them on the staircase. Within the famous Model Village, staff have spotted shadows shifting in tiny windows long after closing time, and faint voices sometimes murmur from the miniature streets when no visitors remain.

These are only some of Bourton's ghost stories. For more tales - from forgotten inns to spectral figures in churchyards - visit Ghosts of the Cotswolds on You-Tube, where the haunted heart of the Cotswolds is explored in full.

Chirps from the Perch (or Peru) In-situ humboldt penguin conservation in Peru On Wednesday 10th

On Wednesday 10th September, our Head of Living Collections, Alistair, set off to the



Estacion Cientifica Programa, Punta San Juan in Peru. Whilst there, he will be taking part in many in-situ conservation projects including one which has a close link to us here at Birdland. Punta San Juan is home to large colonies of wild Humboldt Penguins, which we keep here at Birdland, and it will give us some great experience of how they live in the wild but also to put into practice many of the husbandry techniques which we have developed and use here.

This is the first time that we have sent a team member to partake in a full volunteering role following on from our sponsorship of an ecological penguin study at the same location last year.

The sad news is that Humboldt Penguins are declining significantly in the wild. Populations are suffering from climate change, reduction in food sources and the destruction of nest sites due to guano harvesting (penguin poo). The main purpose of the trip is to help local people collect this rich fertile resource in a safe and less destructive way, meaning that

less nest sites are destroyed during the harvest.

Alistair and the team of other volunteers will also be counting nest sites, monitoring seal and sea lion populations and facilitating the installation of many artificial nesting boxes (see image).



Alistair will be returning back to Birdland on 7th October where I'm sure he will be adding in some content into our daily penguin talks at 11am and 3pm daily, and be sure to follow us on Facebook, Instagram and Tik Tok for regular updates of his project work.
